EXCERPT FROM WDNR STUDY:

"NAMAKAGON LAKE SENSITIVE AREA STUDY & MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES

Namakagon Lake in Bayfield County is a large drainage lake, which has both inlet and outlet stream flows. The lake includes a number of basins with natural surface water connections: Jackson Lake, Cranberry Lake, Namakagon Lake, and Garden Lake. Namakagon Lake is 3227 acres with a maximum depth of 50 feet and an average depth of 16 feet.

The habitats present in Namakagon Lake are very diverse and support a balanced fishery. Muskellunge, northern pike, walleye, and large- and smallmouth bass are the top predators in the lake. Walleye are abundant with the present population being supported solely by natural reproduction. Fall recruitment surveys show above average numbers of fingerling walleye in most years. There is no minimum length for walleye, but only one fish over 14 inches is allowed in order to preserve the adult spawning population. Smallmouth bass are abundant in the lake, as well, and natural reproduction maintains the population. Largemouth bass are relatively abundant in the lake. Muskellunge are present in the lake and are stocked every other year at a rate of one fish per acre. The current muskellunge size limit of 50 inches promotes a trophy fishery. Bluegills are the dominant panfish species present. Their numbers and size structure are above average. Black crappie are moderate in numbers and above average in size structure. Other panfish species (i.e. yellow perch and rock bass) are also present. Wisconsin Shoreland areas on Lake Namakagon provide optimum habitat for many species of wildlife. On the upland, standing dead and dying trees (snags) provide forage sites for insect-eating birds and eventually nesting sites for woodpeckers and songbirds. Cavities in trees provide den sites for many species of birds and mammals. Downed and rotting logs provide homes to many species of wildlife including salamanders, small mammals and invertebrates. Downed logs in or near the water (large woody cover) are especially valuable for resting and feeding areas. Vegetation near the shore and in the water is used for nesting shelter as well as food. Wildlife habitat on Namakagon Lake is best where the shoreline is undeveloped or has been allowed to remain mostly natural. Much of the woody cover has been removed from the water and upland along developed shorelines. Removing large woody cover in the water and understory cover (brush) on the shore degrades fish and wildlife habitat. The aquatic plant diversity (number of different species) in Namakagon Lake is above average for northern Wisconsin, and the aquatic plant community is balanced and ecologically beneficial. Forty-five aquatic/wetland plant species were found during the survey. Generally plant densities are low to moderate, with only a few large plant beds on the lake. Aquatic plant management permits are required for plant control in areas with any species of concern and for chemical control and mechanical harvesting. A permit is not required for manual removal of aquatic plants in an area less than 30 feet wide along

the shoreline, provided the removal is authorized or performed by the riparian property owner and is not located within a designated sensitive area. Please contact your aquatic plant management specialist before conducting any aquatic plant control on Namakagon Lake.

CONCERNED NAMAKAGON LAKE ASSOCIATION MEMBERS

Note: The following two articles are written by active concerned Namakagon Lake Association members. A problem was encountered by Jon Hoffert, Clean Boat/Clean Water volunteer and follow-up addressed by Steve Riley, NLA Vice-President in charge of "Plant/Lake Management and Boat Ramp Monitoring. This problem gave Steve an opportunity to seek the commitment from government agencies to ensure our confidence in those agencies.

NLA Board Members,

This morning I took a turn at CBCW monitoring at the DNR's Highway D ramp. I was there from 8:00 through noon. Pretty slow with only two launches and four people contacted. When done with my shift, I went home for a quick lunch and headed back up Hwy D to run an errand. I was probably away from the ramp for only 20 minutes and as I passed the parking area at the ramp I noticed a new trailer there. I also noticed weeds hanging from the trailer and doubled back for another look. Sure enough. Glenn Grage was out working in his yard, so I asked him to come back to the ramp with me and see what I saw. Gee, now what do we do? I removed the weeds from the trailer and bagged them. Were they Eurasian Water Milfoil? I don't know, probably not, but just as easily could have been. My point is the total ignorance & disregard of the law and total disrespect for the lake. I had one of the yellow sheets the CBCWers use if a trailer has arrived before their shift, jotted a couple of notes on it, and stuck it under the windshield wiper with three other AIS & NLA pamphlets. It's a jungle out there!

AIS ENFORCEMENT AT THE LANDINGS

For the past year, I have been working with USFS, DNR and other governmental agencies to secure a commitment that will insure that the submission of photographic evidence from the NLA owned ILIDS monitoring cameras located on Funny's Bay and Garden Lake will result in citations being issued when violations are found. The initial reaction from USFS was to deny our request to place a camera on Federal property based on their concerns that such a device would be an invasion of privacy and is therefore prohibited. Eight months later, however, after numerous conversations and email correspondence, the USFS agreed to place a large sign at the campground landing and allowed NLA to hire the campground hosts to monitor the landing. Numerous NLA members pushed this process to include our Secretary Bill Porter, Clyde Wishart, the Namakagon Town Board and other individuals.

The Wisconsin DNR, on the other hand, expressed their concern and belief that prior to a citation being issued it was necessary to

prove the offending party actually "intended" to place aquatic vegetation in a given body of water. Their position was "no intent, no citation" in addition to which, no one in that organization was willing to issue a citation based solely on photographic evidence, despite the fact that the Bayfield County Attorney had personally assured me that he would prosecute under such circumstances IF A CITATION WAS ISSUED.

That position, however, changed shortly after NLA member Jon Hoffert observed and photographed a parked vehicle & trailer with aquatic vegetation at the ramp off County Road "D" and emailed the photo's to the NLA Board. Jon's photo's opened up a major debate with Warden Jill Schartner who finally consulted with the DA and advised me that "in the case where the launch camera captures weeds hanging from the boat/trailer and a trailer/boat is launched, the DA and I both agree a photo would be sufficient to issue a citation". The Warden went on to state "Please note, Steve, that I'm on your side and feel we need to do whatever we can to protect the waters of the State. And I appreciate everything people like you do to help me accomplish this ." (9/11/2007)

The bottom line is that your Board, along with the help and support of the membership both financial and otherwise, has made significant progress in dealing the threat of AIS in our beloved Lake. And we will continue to do so given the fact that the membership has made it crystal clear that this issue is of paramount importance to them. Thank all of you for your support!

CLEAN BOAT/CLEAN WATER VOLUNTEERISM

Our boat ramp vigilance is very important to keeping Aquatic Invasive Species (A.I.S.) out of our lake. Two of our ramps are monitored by security cameras; one of our ramps is monitored by paid personnel. The WDNR boat ramp on County Highway D was utilized by boaters quite regularly and not being watched.

WINTER FIRE PREVENTION

With the winter season fast approaching, now is the time to get your home ready for the winter heating season. If you heat with wood your chimney should be inspected and cleaned. Creosote builds up on the walls of the chimney over time and with a hot fire can cause that build up to burn causing a chimney fire. The fire can burn so hot that it can damage the lining of the chimney. Once the chimney has been cracked the fire inside the chimney can get to the wood structures of the house and start the house on fire. That is why a good cleaning and inspection before you start heating for the season is important.

Use only seasoned wood (wood that has had time to dry) in your fireplace or wood burner. Using green wood has more moisture in it, which can lead to more creosote build up inside your chimney. Use only hardwood, not pine, for burning because pine has pitch in it, which can build excessive creosote also.

If you do have a chimney fire, the first thing that you should do is to call 911 for the fire department. Then try to shut down the air supplies to the stove or fireplace by closing the damper or shutting fireplace doors.

You can purchase chimney fire extinguisher which look like a road flair and lights the same way. This would be a good item to have on hand at your home. You would light it and put it into the firebox. The chemicals from the smoke of the flare choke off the oxygen to the fire in the chimney and slow the fire down. Your local fire department probably has these for sale. They cost around \$12 each.

After a chimney fire, it is very important to have your chimney inspected by a professional to make sure there is no damage to the flue before you start another fire to avoid a possible house fire from a damaged chimney. If you look in the yellow pages of the phone book you will find numbers of people that inspect, clean and repair chimneys. Give them a call; they are trained and have the right equipment to do the job properly.

Smoke detectors are your family's first line of defense. There should be a working smoke detector on every level of your home and by your bedrooms. Batteries must be changed once a year. The smoke detector should be vacuumed twice a year and if your detector is over five years old should be replaced. Check your smoke detector once a month. If it doesn't work, check the battery; if it still doesn't work replace it. Smoke detectors are not expensive; you can replace your detector but you cannot replace a life. There should be an escape plan to evacuate your house in case of a fire that everyone knows about and should be practiced so that you know that everyone gets out of the house at the same time. Have a designated meeting spot outside of the home.

Just a reminder about the 911 service, when 911 is dialed you will hear nothing on the line for maybe up to 12 seconds, sometimes it is less some times it could be up to 15 seconds. That is because the call has to be routed through the phone lines to a central station that is miles away, it takes that amount of time for the signal to travel that distance to get to the 911 operator. So don't hang up and

dial again, if you do that it will tie up another line going to the 911 center, a line that someone else might need. Just stay on the line till the dispatcher answers the call and give them all the information that they ask for before you hang up.

I hope these tips help you have a safe and warm winter. Happy holidays!

GARDEN LAKE WATER QUALITY REPORT



I have been doing water testing on Garden Lake for the past four years as do many other volunteers throughout Wisconsin. Milford Place and Ralph Govert have also done testing on Garden Lake from 1992 to 1998. Glen Grage is doing water quality testing on the big Section of Lake Namakagon.

The average secchi disk readings over the years vary from 4' to 7' during the July and August testing. The secchi disk is a black and white disk about the size of a pie plate and you measure how deep you can see it in the water. With our brown water it's not too deep. Some clear water lakes the secchi disk can be seen at 20'. Please see the Garden Lake Graph.

We have also been measuring chlorophyll and phosphorus during the recent years and have seen a slight increase in both over the last three years. This would give us a good reason to use phosphorus free lawn fertilizer on our lawns if we feel it's necessary to fertilize at all.

Water temp and dissolved oxygen levels are measured every three feet of depth. This information helps to determine thermo clines; Lake turnover and how degradation of vegetation on lake bottom. Final results from 2007 will be charted over the winter months. I can say that we had warmer water this year than the past three years. The lake had turned over by September 25th. NAMAKAGON LAKE ASSOCIATION MEETING MINUTES

(September 22, 2007)

The meeting was called to order by President Jim Krueger at 9:09AM.

ALL BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT: Yerhot; Riley; Rasmussen; Porter; Nelson; Krueger; Dupras.

Besides the Board members, there were eight association members present.

MINUTES of June 2nd, 2007 meeting were read and approved.

TREASURES REPORT read. Balance as of August 31, 2007: \$20,483.48. Approved by motion. Discussion followed as to future money needs and utilizing longer term CD's for better return. The movement of money will be left to the treasurers' discretion, as needed for cash flow. It was noted that the donations to the I Lid account to cover the initial purchase is in deficit of \$1020.

BOARD OFFICERS RESPONSIBILITIES: President: Jim Krueger; V.Pres.: Steve Riley; Secretary: Bill Porter; Treasurer: Rick Yerhot; Grant Writer Asso: Tom Nelson; Newsletter Asso: Denise Dupras; Lake & Habitat Improvement Project Coordinator: Phil Rasmussen Motion was made and approved for these individuals responsibilities.

SHORELAND RESTORATION COMMITTEE: Dr. Bob Parsonage is actively involved in heading up this committee of NLA. (Addition after minutes sent out to membership)

BALLOTING PROCEDURE. A motion was made to revise our voting practice.

"The July/August Newsletter will be replaced with a letter of procedure, one ballot per NLA member and nominee's bio. This ballot shall be returned by mail to NLA or brought into the Annual meeting in person." The motion was approved.

NEWSLETTERS: Newsletters will go out in November 2007; April and June 2008. Encouragement was given for members and Board members to submit articles for the newsletter.

CABLE DAYS/FALL FEST: NLA will have a booth to raise awareness of Aquatic Invasive Species and promote the association on Saturday September 29th. AIS literature will be available for interested folks along with info and membership forms for NLA. Helium filled balloons will be given away. Denise has offered a wildlife photograph to NLA for the furtherance of our cause. A motion to raffle the photograph for donations toward our I Lids account was made and approved.

ENVIRONMENTAL SENTRY PROTECTION MONTHLY PAYMENTS: NLA has a signed three year contract with ESP for \$1800. per camera. This covers Monthly video captures; insurance, installation, removal, storage and repair. Steve Riley was recognized by a member associate for his work in implementing the Sentry Systems and pushing for more stringent enforcement for AIS offences.

2008 GRANTS: Steve reported his research with Liesch Environmental Services, Inc. Choices of grant programs are numerous and money is available through the WDNR for our projects. Three choices of Grants, with variable complexity and benefits were analyzed by LES. 1) Aquatic Invasive Species Control Grants 2) Lake Management Planning Grants-Large Scale 3) Lake Protection & Classification Grants. Analysis research will continue between LES and NLA.

CASTLE CREEK BEAVER CONTROL: We have worked with the WDNR and USDA, in the past, in respect to clearing beaver obstacles in Castle Creek. The charge for this service is \$400. Walleye spawning is believed to be increased by keeping this creek open. Denise has volunteered to check the creek via kayak before entering into contract with USDA to see if their services would be prudent.

BAYFIELD COUNTY LAKES FORUM: We have been invited to join the BCLF. The organization is an advocate to Preserving and protecting the lakes of Bayfield County. A motion was made and carried to donate \$150. to the organization and Jim Krueger volunteered to be our liaison.

BAYFIELD COUNTY EVASIVE SPECIES COMMITTEE: Jim Krueger is our NLA representative.

BUOY REMOVAL: No Wake Buoys will be removed on or about October 27th. Jim, Bill, Tom, Rick and Steve will assist.

ADDITIONAL ROCK BUOYS: Requests have been made to NLA for additional ROCK buoys. These requests and locations will be passed along to the Town Of Namakagon. Anyone with requests is advised to pass the info, in form of a map and locations marked, to Jim Krueger.

NLA PROJECTS FOR 2008: Fun on the Water/Youth Safety Skills Day; Fall Fest/Cable Days; Lake Clean Up; Newsletters (3); AIS monitoring; Water Testing; Beaver Control in Castle Creek; Fishery Improvement.

SHORELAND LIGHTING

(1) All outdoor lighting on shoreland lots which is within 300 feet of the ordinary high water mark shall meet the following requirements:

- a. Lighting shall be controlled so as not to shine up into the sky or onto any neighboring property or onto navigable waters. This may be accomplished by use of fully shielded cut-off fixtures, directing light fixtures downward rather than upward, or by other similarly effective means.
- b. Where lighting is for security purposes or to illuminate walkways, roadways, equipment yards or parking lots, only fully shielded cut-off style light fixtures shall be used.
- c. All illuminated signs for commercial purposes visible from navigable waters shall be turned off between 11:00 p.m. and sunrise except that signs may be illuminated while the business facility is open to the public.
- d. All forms of flashing, rotating, or moving lights shall be prohibited.

(2) The above requirements shall apply immediately to all lighting installed after September 25, 2001, and must be complied with no later than September 25, 2006, with respect to any lighting in existence as of September 25, 2001.

(3) The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to seasonal holiday lighting.
